PARISH COUNCIL: CLERK'S COLUMN

At the October parish council meeting there were planning applications from 3 Broadfields, to which the council had no objections, and Unit 6, Trade City Oxford, Sandy Lane West about which the council had concerns about the height of the flue, and nature of emissions.

At the November meeting there were planning applications from 32 Cardinal Close, & 5 Chapel Lane, to which the Council had no objections. Oxford City Council informed the Parish Council that 18 Denny Gardens, 38 Minchery Road and Unit 6, Trade City Oxford, Sandy Lane West have all been approved.

The two vacant Councillor seats were filled by co-option with Agnieszka (Aga) Mackowska and Peter White being successful. Thank you to everyone who applied, including those who were not successful.

We heard that the Littlemore Parish Council Fun Day in Oxford Road Recreation Ground on 27 September was well attended, with approximately 200 children and 100 adults. The parish council thanks everyone involved in organising the event, volunteering on the day, and helping set up and dismantle everything. We are considering a similar event next year.

The Parish Council has approved a final set of plans for new play equipment in the Oxford Road Recreation Ground. The project has been a long-time objective of the Parish Council, and we hope Phase 1 will start later this year or early next. Further facilities for older children are being planned, and outside gym equipment.

The Neighbourhood Plan has been approved by the Oxford City Council and will now go to referendum. For more information, please see Tony Eaude's entry, right.

Proposed Lowering of the Age Range to include 2 Year Olds We firmly believe that high-quality Early Years education gives children the best possible start, laying a strong foundation for learning and development throughout their primary school journey. LITTLEMORE'S PLACE in the INDICES OF DEPRIVATION The English Indices of Deprivation 2025 includes data on

The English Indices of Deprivation 2025 includes data on the following 7 domains: income, employment, health, education, crime, housing, & living environment. The latest figures, which are typically updated every 3–5 years, have just been released.

What does the data show about Oxford?

It shows that there remains a stark divide between the least & most deprived areas. While 21 of Oxford's 83 neighbourhoods are now in the 10% least deprived areas in England, 2 areas (in Northfield Brook) are in the top 10% most deprived areas in England, and 4 areas (2 in Blackbird Leys, 1 in Littlemore, and 1 in Rose Hill) are in the top 20% most deprived areas in England.

How does the City Council tackle deprivation & inequality?

It provides council homes, and has invested in Oxford's five leisure centres to tackle health inequality. It provides low-cost youth clubs and holiday activities for young people, including in Blackbird Leys, Rose Hill and Barton; it will provide over £1m in grant funding in 2025/26 to the city's community groups and charities to provide support for local communities, and it invests in the city's community centres. It has built new community centres in Rose Hill, Blackbird Leys & East Oxford. THE COWLEY BRANCH LINE

The Department for Transport announced on October 23 that the two-mile line will reopen to passenger traffic, they hope by 2029/30. Two new stations at Littlemore and Cowley will be built to support up to 10,000 new homes and jobs in south-east Oxford, and support the Oxford-Cambridge Growth Corridor, which has been described as a national asset for science, technology, and innovation. Reinstating passenger services is expected to cost £155 million. The government is committing £120m with the rest sourced locally.

Reopening the Cowley branch line will help free up Oxford station, allowing East West Rail to terminate in Oxford when it goes to 4 trains an hour. Work to upgrade the freight-only line (which serves BMW Mini) will be done by breaking the route into sections to establish what needs to be done. Network Rail non-negotiables include track layout enhancements south of Oxford, upgrading the 5 level crossings along the branch line, raising the line speed from 25mph to 50mph, adding a new passing loop to allow freight and passenger trains to pass, and an improved signalling system. The plan is to extend London Marylebone / Oxford services to Cowley. Paths for increases in freight traffic will be possible.

The long-running campaign to get the line reopened to passengers is successful now because Network Rail spent approximately £1m on a Strategic Business Case, Oxford City Council spent £4.75m on a Full Business Case, and the Ellison Institute of Technology plans to invest up to £10 billion locally, and employ around 7000 staff at its growing campus near the Littlemore station. ARC Oxford, formerly Oxford Business Park, is located near what will become Cowley station. The local authority has incentivised landowners who will benefit from the railway to help contribute to the business case, and to the additional £35m needed to help fund the upgrade of the line.

ABOUT THE PROPOSALS TO RE-SHAPE LOCAL GOVERNMENT

Since 1974 Oxfordshire has 6 local councils arranged in 2 tiers. There's 1 county council (Oxfordshire), and 5 district councils (Oxford City, Cherwell, South Oxfordshire, Vale of White Horse, & West Oxfordshire). Each tier has different areas of responsibility, laid out in the table on p 6. In Littlemore, different services are provided by the City & County Councils. The Government has asked councils across England for interim proposals on simplifying the structure of local government in their areas. Oxfordshire's six councils submitted joint proposals on 21 March (see LITTLEMORE LOCAL Issue 463).

The county's 6 councils would be abolished and replaced with:

ONE UNITARY COUNCIL:

Proposed by Oxfordshire County Council, this option would replace all existing district & county councils with 1 new council.

or TWO UNITARY COUNCILS:

- Oxford and Shires Council: covering all of the existing district areas of Cherwell, Oxford City and West Oxfordshire
- Ridgeway Council: covering all of the existing district areas of South Oxfordshire and the Vale of White Horse, and the whole of West Berkshire Council's area
- or THREE UNITARY COUNCILS: this model is favoured by Oxford City Council
- **Greater Oxford Council:** Oxford with expanded boundaries to include its Green Belt
- Northern Oxfordshire Council: much of the existing West Oxfordshire & Cherwell districts
- Ridgeway Council: much of the existing South Oxfordshire & Vale of White Horse districts & West Berkshire, but with villages within the Green Belt closest to the city becoming part of Greater Oxford

In each model the new councils would be single tier, and responsible for <u>all</u> council services in their area.

Timeline: Consultation closed in late July. Proposals will be submitted by November 28, 2025, with decisions expected in mid 2026 and new councils potentially launching in April 2028.

In support of its ideas, in March, the City council said:

- the creation of a greater Oxford council would enable them to join up and improve services that are currently split between Oxford City Council and Oxfordshire County Council.
- a new central Oxfordshire unitary council would reflect local identities, bringing the design and delivery of these services much closer to local residents than is currently the case. Improving bus services into the city from neighbouring villages would be a priority for the new council.
- a greater focus on prevention of inequality, and on ensuring access to good jobs would be central to tackling the inequalities that drive pressure on the social care system. A greater Oxford council would work with institutions, businesses and grassroots organisations to prioritise action on inequalities, like health issues, supporting young people, ensuring community safety.
- a Greater Oxford council might accelerate the delivery of both affordable homes, and secure, well-paid jobs for residents in Oxford and the surrounding area.
- This is because Oxford City council's current administrative boundaries are drawn tightly around the city's existing housing estates & business parks, and there is little available space to meet the significant demand for new housing, office space, laboratories, leisure facilities, and so on.

- However, sites outside the city (for example, land currently in South Oxfordshire, south of Grenoble Road) have already been allocated to provide additional housing to meet Oxford's need. City council says that a unitary authority based on the city with expanded boundaries could take charge of some of these sites, and increase housing density where appropriate to produce well-planned new communities.
- It would also release Grey Belt land as the Government has directed: this is essentially land within the Green Belt that, according to some, may be suitable for development. It is anticipated that city-adjacent housing sites would be higher density low-rise developments.
- The City council said they were exploring different boundary options, taking into account local geography, economic and transport links, and the Green Belt, and will be engaging with stakeholders, residents, and businesses.
- Oxford has one of the UK's most successful local economies: it's a net contributor to the Exchequer – generating £7.6bn annually. In 2023 & 2024 it was ranked the top performing city in the UK by PricewaterhouseCoopers. It's fifth in the UK for attracting overseas investment. The City council says that:
 - a greater Oxford unitary council would be financially robust, inheriting the Oxford Model, with significant assets and wholly owned companies that deliver services for the council and private clients, and generate income.
 - millions of pounds would be saved across Oxford and West Berkshire though the proposed changes
 - and more economic growth could be unlocked.

The City's argument for a unitary model that would increase its lands and its powers was re-iterated in September in The Case for Cities report which was prepared on behalf of Cambridge, Exeter, Gloucester, Ipswich, Lincoln, Norwich, Oxford, Peterborough, Reading, and Swindon, and published on Sept 23. Our local MP, Anneliese Dodds contributed the foreword. The report argues that:

Cities are England's growth engines, but too many are still governed by outdated boundaries defined a generation ago: local Government reorganisation presents a once in a generation opportunity to create a connected network of high-performing cities that drives national prosperity, while also addressing the needs of these cities and their public services. It goes on to say that we need to:

- empower cities by creating a new generation of city-led unitaries, distinct from county-scale models, so cities can govern at the right scale to deliver growth, reform, and prevention for their communities.
- make city-led unitaries the right size by reforming outmoded boundaries.
- commit to a long term national cities' strategy that recognises their role in delivering national missions and key commitments such as the spending review and industrial strategy.
- back a polycentric England by investing in a connected network of high-performing cities, beyond the core city-led metropolitan areas, to drive balanced growth across England and the UK.
- hardwire prevention into public services by equipping cities to lead on prevention by aligning health, housing, and care services at the urban scale, with the data, powers, and partnerships needed to act early.

Community Engagement and Visibility

As City Councillor for Littlemore, I believe in building hope through action. Positive energy and meaningful engagement are essential to delivering lasting change. Our role as local representatives is not to complain or shift blame, but to listen, act, and lead.

Each week, I knock on doors across Littlemore, aiming to reach every household at least once a year. In November, I visited residents at Newman Place, Armstrong Road, where several urgent concerns were raised.

Residents Raise Urgent Concerns Over Conditions at Newman Place

Residents expressed frustration over the absence of a promised playground, despite it being included in development plans and service charges. For a community with many young families, this is a serious omission. Repeated lift breakdowns have left some residents—especially those with mobility challenges—effectively trapped in their homes. Safety concerns are growing, with reports of crime and anti-social behaviour. Parking remains difficult, worsened by construction vehicles and the lack of designated spaces. These issues have been formally raised with Peabody Housing Association and Thames Valley Police, and I've requested a meeting to explore solutions.

Investing in Denny Gardens: A New Chapter for Community Growing

Elsewhere in Littlemore, I've allocated Ward Member Budget funding to support the Oxfordshire Community Land Trust in launching a new community gardening site at Denny Gardens. A part-time Project Coordinator will help establish an allotment committee and co-design the space with residents. We aim to open the site to plot holders by February 2026.

Support for Grassroots Initiatives

I continue to champion grassroots creativity through the Littlemore Arts Hub. On 7 September, I attended another inspiring Visual Arts Workshop at St Mary & St Nicholas Church, this time led by local artist Alex Singleton. I'm proud to sponsor this initiative, which fosters imagination and connection. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Alex for generously sharing his talent in service of our community. The November Littlemore Window Walkabout was also funded through my budget. Organised by Eve McWilliam and supported by local artists, the event invites residents to decorate their windows across three evenings 21 to 23 November). Promotional materials were delivered to every household, and the event has received coverage in the Oxford Mail, Oxford Times, and That's TV Oxford. Two workshops supported residents in preparing their displays, and I contributed a decoration at Littlemore Village Hall to help light up the space.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank Eve for her care and attention to detail in organising this event, which I believe has the potential to become a proud annual tradition for Littlemore.

Youth Empowerment Initiative

I'm also working with four local schools to launch a youth empowerment initiative focused on creativity, leadership, and aspiration-building. More details will follow soon.

Your Voices Drive Highway Improvements in Littlemore

Following the September closure of Oxford Road, I invited County Cabinet Member for Highways, Cllr Andrew Gant, and senior officers to witness firsthand the traffic challenges affecting Littlemore. I then called on residents to share their experiences — and the response was both thoughtful and urgent.

Concerns centred on congestion, unsafe junctions, pollution, and neglected infrastructure across key hotspots: Newman Road, Cowley Road Littlemore, Oxford Road, and Spring Lane during football matches. Residents described chaotic parking, ignored signage, and the cumulative impact of new developments and heavy vehicle use. Suggestions included introducing yellow lines on Oxford Road to ease morning gridlock and adjusting bus gate timings to reduce peak-hour pressure.

Sandy Lane West was also flagged, where construction traffic is already causing disruption. Once new homes are occupied, additional vehicles are expected to spill into neighbouring streets, worsening access and safety.

These insights have been passed directly to Cllr Gant. I now invite residents to consider supporting a full traffic analysis and a collaborative workshop with Oxfordshire County Council. However the flooring has again lifted and become a trip hazard. I have now requested a full safety inspection of the playground and its flooring and am awaiting a date for this.


A shot of a common frog reflected in a golden pool has been crowned the winner of Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire Wildlife Trust wildlife photography contest. The winning photo was taken by Peter Smith at BBOWT's Letcombe Valley Nature Reserve.

Peter said: "I knew that common frogs congregate every year to breed in a small pond at Letcombe, but no one knows exactly when. So I kept an eye on the local nature reports, and visited Letcombe several times until I got the right day. I captured this bird in the late afternoon sun: reflections from the background foliage make the water appear golden."

Thomas Roberts won the People's Choice Award with his capture of great-crested grebe chicks riding on their parent's back. Thomas said: "I had to lie down on the ground and wait patiently: it finally paid off when the great crested grebe family swam past me allowing a window into their world."

The winners were chosen by BBOWT's Wild Magazine editor Ben Vanheems, BBOWT's membership assistant Beth Milner, 2024 People's Choice Award finalist Jo Brown, and wildlife photographer Steve Gozdz of GG Wildlife Experiences.

Ben Vanheems said: "What I look for in a photo is something with a story to tell. It's also great when you get to see something from a fresh perspective or an unexpected angle. The quality this time has stepped up even further and it becomes even more difficult to judge. Is it the equipment or the fact that the competition is becoming more and more popular? Whatever it is, you don't make it easy for us!"

Washable (reusable) nappies are made of bamboo, hemp, cotton or microfibre. A baby needs only around 20 to 30 of them: they can save parents several hundred pounds with their first baby, and even more if re-used for subsequent children.

- The Reusable Nappy Week website has a guide on sizes, materials and how to get started.
- The Oxon Cloth Nappy Library has a loan scheme.

Tiago explained the philosophy that underpins his work for us. After meeting residents he has taken forward to Peabody and to Thames Valley Police urgent concerns about conditions at Newman Place. He has allocated funds to support 2 new community initiatives: the development of Denny Gardens allotments into community space and the Littlemore Arts Hub November Window Walkabout. He is working with local schools to launch a youth empowerment initiative, and, in preparation for meetings with Cllr Gant has collated initial information from residents about chaotic parking, ignored signage, and the cumulative impact of new developments and heavy vehicle use on Littlemore's roads.

Anne names the community champions for September and October and invites residents to continue making suggestions for future champions. She describes how fly tipping beside street bins has caused some bins to be removed, though there is a new one by the fish & chip shop. She is concerned about Minchery Farm Playground, and has asked for a full safety inspection. She describes the Friday Social Club at the Community Centre, & the Christmas tree event on December 5 (see Dates for Your Diary).

David thanks the Parish Council for funding the CCTV camera on Cowley Rd LM. He acknowledges that his campaign to have the temporary congestion charge scrapped was unsuccessful: however a workshop for residents to support congestion charge pass applications will be provided at the Community Centre, whose Friday Lunch Club goes from strength to strength. He plans a survey to address a request to make Oxford Road one way, and has asked officers to consider adding extra double yellow lines to Oxford Road between the shop and the ring road*. He has asked ODS to raise the profile of a manhole cover in Swinbourne Road which has had some resurfacing leaving the cover low. He mentions his support for the return of a pharmacy to Littlemore**. He had a walkabout with Mogridge Drive residents and noted serious problems on the new estate, including lack of safe pedestrian access and road signage (which officers are already aware of), and unusable EV charging points.***

- * Such changes would require formal public consultation Ed **The provision and distribution of pharmacies is an NHS clinical commissioning decision and is not within the gift of local county or city councils. Ed
- *** The roads on the estate have not yet been adopted by the Council as is normal with new estates still under construction, so they are not fully a Council responsibility. I asked Royal Mail for a letter box to be placed on the estate @18 months ago and was told that it had to wait until the road was adopted. Ed

TEMPORARY CONGESTION CHARGE

Six congestion charge points for those travelling by car in Oxford are now in place.
